Wikipedia: Definition

"Wikipedia ([/wɪkɪ'piːdiə/](#) (listen) *wik-ih-PEE-dee-ə* or [/_wɪki-/](#) (listen) *wik-ee-*) is a [free content, multilingual online encyclopedia](#) written and maintained by [a community of volunteers](#) through a model of [open collaboration](#), using a [wiki](#)-based editing system. Individual contributors, also called editors, are known as [Wikipedians](#). It is the largest and most-read [reference work](#) in history.
[3] It is consistently one of the 15 most popular websites ranked by [Alexa](#); as of 2021, Wikipedia was ranked the 13th most popular site.[3][4] It is hosted by the [Wikimedia Foundation](#), an [American non-profit organization](#) funded mainly through donations.[5]"

Wikipedia's fundamental principles are summarized in five pillars:

1. Wikipedia is an Encyclopedia
2. Wikipedia is written from a neutral point of view

3. Wikipedia is free content that anyone can use, edit, and distribute
4. Wikipedia's editors should treat each other with respect and civility
5. Wikipedia has no firm rules


Wikimedia's mission statement is:






	Talk	Editors can discuss improvements to the Wikipedia article
