<p>structure: opening of the speech</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - introduction to subject - establish common ground between speaker and audience - set tone for the speech - reinforce speaker's authority to speak on the subject - arouse interest in the subject - segue smoothly into the subject 	<p>by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - dramatic: shocking statistics - question: rhetorical question - reference - (not common in parliamentary setting, rather conferences: novelty: anecdote, imagine a scenario - humorous)
<p>structure: main part</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - explain your point of view with information obtained before - arrange main points in a logical order - for each main point: appropriate supporting points, evidence from research 	<p>by "tell[ing] them</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - what you're going to say, - say it, - and then tell them what you've said!"
<p>structure: conclusion</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - briefly restate main arguments - memorable - make sure that the audience understand the main theme of the speech 	<p>by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - summarizing - direct appeal: asking audience to take specific action - references: e.g. to the opening of the speech - (not common in parliamentary setting, rather conferences: inspirational: quotation, poem, ...)
